#### **Cloud Classifications and Characteristics**

Low-level clouds are not given a prefix, although their names are derived from "strato" or "cumulo," depending on their characteristics Low clouds occur below 6500 feet, and normally consist of liquid water droplets or even supercooled droplets, except during cold winter storms when ice crystals

(and snow) comprise much of the clouds

Low-level clouds are found below 6,500 feet and although they are mostly made up of water droplets They can also be composed of ice particles and snow in very cold temperatures Stratus clouds are among the low-lying clouds They are gray clouds that cover the entire sky and can be the result of very thick fog lifting in the morning

WEATHER THEORY Temperature, Pressure And Moisture Every physical process of weather is a result of a heat exchange The standard sea level temperature is 15 degrees C It decreases an average of 2 degrees C per 1,000 feet The standard temperature for any altitude can be determined by subtracting (from 15 degrees C) 2

High Clouds High clouds form at 16,000 - 43,000 feet Basically, these are the clouds that you only encounter on the top of really high mountains or at the cruising altitude of a jet airplane Due to the extreme conditions at which they form, they tend to be comprised primarily of ice crystals High clouds do not block sunlight
